Celebrating 250 years of the U.S. Navy with a Ball on October 18, 2025

The event is being held at the Trident Technical College in North Charleston. In January 2025 the Charleston Council assumed responsibility for hosting the annual event and is helping a group of active duty Navy volunteers to manage the arrangements and build financial support and sponsorships. The Council's Navy Ball Committee also hosted a successful golf tournament in July to raise funds to benefit the Ball. Funds raised for the event goes towards reducing the ticket prices for Active Duty, Reserve, Civilian and Retired service members attending the Ball.

Initiating planning for an annual U.S. Coast Guard Ball

Building on the success of the Navy Ball, the Council took the lead on initiating an inaugural USCG Ball to be held in 2026 – a celebration of the region's official status as a Coast Guard Community which the Council arranged in 2024. Importantly, the Council partnered with the Coast Guard Foundation and the Propeller Club of Charleston to marshal the resources needed to ensure success in what will be a major new event for the area.

Commissioned and Adopted Units

We made significant contributions to the MWR accounts for USS PETERSON, RALPH JOHNSON and CHARLESTON whom we recently commissioned. We have adopted USCGC HAMILTON, JAMES, STONE and expect to adopt CALHOUN whom we commissioned in 2024.

USS CHARLESTON LCS - 18 Namesake Crew Visit

Our fourth attempt was finally successful in getting crew members from the ship based in San Diego CA to visit the namesake city of LCS-18. We began planning the visit in 2020 but were derailed by COVID. Starting again in 2024 two planned visits were overcome by operational requirements.

Finally, we met the crew at the Charleston airport on July 21 2025. The contingent consisted of the Commanding Officer, CDR Meghan Gray and nine crew members. The crew made quite an impression around town as they moved very smartly in their tropical white uniforms.

Our first stop was North Charleson to visit
Mayor Burgess. This was followed by lunch at the
Blind Tiger pub and then a tour of the American
College of the Building Arts in downtown
Charleston.

A reception for the crew was sponsored by the Daughters' of the American Revolution and hosted by Mary Ann Warwick at her house on Johns Island.

The next day included another visit to downtown

and the Old Exchange Building and Charleston Battery.



Moving to Mt. Pleasant, lunch was at the Tavern and Table Restaurant with the Palmetto Military Support Group Board and Charleston Battery Soccer Executive team. A visit to the USS YORKTOWN at Patriots Point was a chance for the Commanding Officer of the USS CHARLESTON to give a briefing to board members and the volunteers who serve on the YORKTOWN Museum. The next day, the crew visited the Citadel NROTC unit, had a tour of the campus and talked about the ROTC program.

We next visited the USCG Cutter JAMES where the Charleston crew toured the ship and lunched with the JAMES crew.

The final event of the day was a visit the River Dogs baseball team and the ship's mascot at their Stadium with a tour of the facility.

The next morning, the crew gathered at the Pinnacle Financial Partners facility in Charleston with the community and business leaders and leaders from local military commands. Commander Gray gave a ship's briefing to the gathered audience about the history and capabilities of the USS CHARLESTON.

The crew visited the USCG Maritime Law Enforcement Academy (MLEA) where they gained a firsthand look at MLEA's training operations - including underway evolutions with the Non-Compliant Vessel Pursuit School and walk-throughs of mock LE boarding platforms.

A recent LCS-18 deployment included an embarked USCG Law Enforcement Detachment (LEDET), further highlighting the strength of our joint mission. The MLEA expressed being grateful for the Navy partnership and look forward to continued collaboration in advancing maritime security.





Support to the waterfront

Charleston will soon become the USCG's largest cutter homeport in the nation. The USCG obtained part of the old Navy base and is building out the new space including several pier upgrades.

We were privileged to help support the USCG 235th birthday celebration at a nearby USN recreation facility. The event was attended by more than 400 USCG members and families. This year the Council funded an ice cream truck – a big hit on a warm August day.



The Greater Charleston Council takes the lead in organizing a variety of volunteer organizations to support crewmembers and their families when major cutters return from lengthy deployments. In August the Charleston Council worked with Palmetto Military Support Group, Towns4Troops, First Command Financial and the USCG Auxiliary to welcome back the USCGC HAMILTON to her homeport following a lengthy and record-breaking counter-drug deployment.

Together, we provided food and drink for the crew and

their friends and families as well as sign-making materials to ensure that everyone received a warm "welcome home."

Naval Nuclear Power School

The Greater Charleston Council supports the Naval Nuclear Power School every Monday by participating in a four-hour Naval Heritage session for new arrivals. The program includes an introduction to the propulsion systems on board the USS YORKTOWN followed by a series of discussions that include submarine development and operations during the Cold War and beyond.

The participants also get exposure to naval history and nuclear power development. Board member Bob MacPherson developed and delivered the submarine presentation based on his experiences as a Submarine Engineering Technician during the Cold War.

The Council also supports the school's awards program by taking part in graduation ceremonies providing certificates that recognize the outstanding performers in each class.

Navy Ombudsman

An Ombudsman is an official representative of the Commanding Officer and plays a vital role in establishing and maintaining current and correct communication. This is an important function, especially when a ship is deployed. In September we presented flowers and letters of appreciation to the area Navy Ombudsman at the 55th Anniversary of the Navy Ombudsman Program celebration at the Charleston Naval Weapons Station. Twenty of the Ombudsmen were recognized from the Charleston area commands.

Youth Programs

The annual Citadel NROTC awards ceremony allows our Council to recognize the outstanding Navy and Marine Corps graduates each year by providing uniform swords the each of those individuals.

Palmetto Cyber Defense Competition

PCDC, Eastern defense forum: Navy League Charleston Council was a PLATINUM Level (\$2700) Sponsor for the Palmetto Cyber Defense Competition held at Trident Technical College in North Charleston 12-14 APR 2025. The goal of annual PCDC events is to energize South Carolina Colleges, High Schools, and their students to focus on the development of technical skills in the areas of networking and cyber security in preparation for exciting careers in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). PCDC contributes to build the cyber-capable workforce in the South Carolina Lowcountry. USS Charleston Visit Reinforces Our Region's Critical Role in National Defense

Charleston's connection to the military is more than symbolic, it's active, enduring and deeply rooted in both our history and our future. This past week, we had the distinct honor of welcoming (nine crew members from) the USS Charleston (LCS-18) back to its namesake city. The visit offered an opportunity to strengthen the bond between ship's crew and our region, while spotlighting the evolving mission of the Littoral Combat Ship (LCS) class and the strategic role our community plays in supporting national defense. The USS Charleston is the sixth ship named after the historic City of Charleston. The original USS Charleston was a row galley that served in the United States Navy from 1798 to 1802. The Littoral Combat Ship is a class of relatively small, fast and agile



warships designed for operations in near-shore or littoral environments. These vessels are intended to counter threats like mines, submarines and small surface craft, and can operate independently or as part of a larger naval force. LCS ships are known for their modular design, allowing them to quickly adapt to different missions with interchangeable mission packages.

The ship's Commanding Officer, Commander Meghan Gray, along with nine members of her crew, traveled from San Diego, California, where the USS Charleston is home ported, to visit Charleston. During their visit, Commander Gray and her crew met with several city leaders and toured the city. Commander Gray provided an excellent overview of the evolution of the LCS class since the first ships were commissioned and discussed the challenges faced by the class as new mission sets are introduced. One significant change in the LCS class is the increase in

crew size, expanding from approximately 40 sailors to about 100 to support new mission sets and maintenance requirements. The USS Charleston has adapted to the evolving demands of the LCS class with great success and has performed admirably in the Pacific Fleet theater of operations.

Looking to the future, the USS Charleston will increase its coordination with the United States Marine Corps and employment of unmanned air and surface vehicles in the littoral environment. Additionally, in 2026, the ship will shift its home port to Bahrain. We wish the officers and crew of the USS Charleston much success as they operate in the increasingly hostile environment of the Red Sea.
